

READ A STORY THOROUGHLY AND THOUGHTFULLY

Common Core Anchor Reading Standard 1. Read closely to determine what the text says explicitly and to make logical inferences from it; cite specific textual evidence when writing or speaking to support conclusions drawn from the text.

Teacher notes:

The core questions can be applied to any story.

For the inferential questions, accept any logical answers that students can support. **Identify an unfamiliar word for students to define for item 4.**

If you locate a question that students cannot answer appropriately, use that as a "teachable moment"—for example, think out loud and make a "thinking path"—a step-by-step guide to figuring out how to answer that kind of question.

Expand activities are opportunities for students to think more.

CORE QUESTIONS

- 1. Identify sequence:
 What happened first? What happened next? What happened last?
- 2. Identify important character: Name one important character in the story.
- 2A Infer character trait: What is one trait you infer that character has?
- 2B Explain why you think that.
- 3. Identify important action: What is something important that character does?
- 3A. Infer Motive: Why do you think that character does that?
- 4. Infer meaning from context: Your teacher will give you a word to define. What does that word mean as used in this passage?
- 5. Retell a story: Draw or tell who was in the story and what happened.
- 5. Infer the lesson: What is an idea or lesson people can learn from this story?

Expand: Create

- > Sequence: **Draw pictures with captions that tell the story.**
- > Predict: Write the next part of this story—with pictures and captions.

The next pages include graphic organizers that require students to demonstrate the ability to respond to these questions.
