## Genre Guide

Involve Students: Students give—or write—examples of each kind of genre. Then they explain what kinds of strategies and structures a writer uses to write in that genre—and how a reader can figure out what is important when reading that genre.

## LITERATURE

A play in which different events and characters tell a story with
dialogue. It may be fiction or nonfiction.
A fable tells a story that has a moral—it teaches a lesson. Fables
have animals in their stories instead of people.
FantasyA kind of <b>fiction</b> that involves characters, situations, or
settings that could not really happen. Many fantasy stories involve
magic or impossible events.
Folk tales are fictional stories handed down by generations and
represent the ways people lived in a culture and may tell a lesson
about how to live.
Historical fiction is based on imagination (like fiction), but set among
actual events or during a specific period of history.
Fictional story that seems possible and takes place in the past. It
tells about what might have happened, it is believable.
A mystery is <b>fiction</b> that deals with puzzling events & suspenseful
situations. Many mysteries are about solving a crime.
A myth is <b>fiction</b> that uses supernatural characters to tell a story that
represents important values of a culture.
Poetry is a type of writing that uses rhythm to communicate ideas
and feelings. There are many different forms of poetry. Some rhyme.
Many use images to help the reader understand the ideas.
Realistic fiction is made up by the writer but is a narrative that could
have taken place. The characters and events seem to be real.
Science fiction uses real science and imagined science in a realistic
situation. It might be set in the future or space.
A story that has unbelievable events that is told as if it was real.

## NONFICTION

Article or Report	An explanation of a topic.
Autobiography	The narrative of a person's life, told by that person.
Biography	A biography is an account of someone's life, told by another.
History	A history explains a real event with facts.
Memoir	A person's written recollection of events.
News report	A description of a real event.
Textbook	A textbook explains ideas and information about a topic.

## INFORMATIONAL TEXT

This actually is a sub-genre of nonfiction. It includes directions, manuals, newspaper, advertisements, and reference materials: dictionary, encyclopedia, glossary, thesaurus.
