Recommended Kinds of Responses

The recommended responses are examples of kinds of responses students could make.

To increase the challenge and usefulness of the guide as an assessment, students can include examples from a story to show what their strategy means.

First, I preview the story. This is what I do.

Title—I think about the title. I ask myself, _____
