Involve students to build citizenship.

The following pages are examples of surveys your students can take to learn more about how to make school-community progress.

Taking surveys is just the beginning of kinds of questions to ask about the school and actions they can take. As students collect information, have them tally it in tables and make graphs. Ask them to write reports on their findings. That will be a service to the school. You will find guides to service learning

After students complete the surveys of parents, other students, and community members, they should prepare a report that you include in the plans you make for your school's progress.

If you continue to involve students in school progress surveys and service learning each quarter, you will build citizenship and skills.
