There are three parts to this initiative:

- A competence-based curriculum emphasizes meaningful outcomes
- Weekly focus and assignments make student responsibilities clear
- Students track and report their own progress.

The emphasis on having students respond to questions about their own learning is designed to inform teachers and also to emphasize to students their responsibility for their own learning. This practice of surveying students is unusual but very important to get effective current insights into student progress and learning obstacles. A noted educator pointed out,

"Finally, and most overlooked among educators, are the learners themselves, ... Thus, every person, regardless of his or her age, is in charge of his or her own selfeducation. We are all recipients of our own advice more than that of others." Schubert, William H. <u>Curriculum: Perspective, Paradigm, and Possibility.</u> New York: Macmillan, 1986. 6.
