What does the author want us to understand?

He wants us to understand that sometimes we make the stereotypes about certain things subconsciously, and out of more ignorance than rudeness or unkindness. He also want's us to understand that you need to know more than one side of a story to have an unbiased opinion on something. Humans also tend to think that other people are better off than themselves because they have not experienced the lives that other people have. The stereotypes that people make through ignorance are often wrong and biased, and can sometimes be harmful to the people that the stereotypes are about, so people should stop making subconscious stereotypes of each other out of ignorance.
