It's Your Right

Soon after the Constitution was completed in 1788, ten amendments were added to it, the Bill of Rights. Actually, twelve amendments were proposed by Congress to the states. The Constitution required that states approve, or ratify, amendments before they could be added. Ten were approved and added to the Constitution in 1791.

- 1. Congress not to interfere with freedom of religion, speech or press, assembly, and petition.
- 2. The people secured in their right to bear arms.
- 3. Quartering of soldiers on the people restricted.
- 4. Unreasonable searches forbidden.
- 5. Individuals guaranteed rights when on trial and the right to life, liberty, and property.
- 6. Accused persons assured of right to speedy and public trial by an impartial jury, to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, to have assistance of defense counsel.
- 7. Right to trial by jury.
- 8. Excessive bail, fines, punishments forbidden.
- 9. People retain the rights not assigned to government.
- 10. Powers not delegated to the federal government are reserved to the States or the people.

Discussion Points:

The following questions all require you to analyze and infer.

- Why would people have needed to add these amendments to the Constitution?
- Who would have supported each one?
- Who might have opposed each one at the time they were added?
- What do you think might have been included in the two amendments that the states did not approve?

The Importance of Voting

Four amendments to the Constitution helped increase people's right to vote in elections in this nation.

Article 15, passed in 1870, guaranteed voting rights to all citizens of all races. Article 19, passed in 1920, guaranteed voting rights to women. Article 24, passed, in 1964, required that states could not require a tax to vote. Article 26, passed in 1971, lowered the voting age from 21 to 18.
